THRILLING RIDES

A side story to THE KENSINGTON LINE

Sometime in 1935 after the secession of street car operations on the Kensington Line, my friend, Gilbert Raynor and I "borrowed" a decrepit, former street car line four-wheeled flat car from a small Kensington junk yard. We tied it on the end of a long rope and dragged it noisily behind Dad's '28 Dodge on the streets to "Gilly's" house. He lived on Frederick Ave. close to the car tracks. His driveway became the "carbarn". We rebuilt the wood deck and greased the axle bearings. It had an eye at each end for a coupling bar or a chain.. It lacked brakes, so we devised a sprag brake out of a 2x4 with a pivot bolt into the side frame. The short end was levered against a wheel.

Now the abandoned car line had a very slight downgrade all the way from Gilly's house, about a mile, to the Rock Creek trestle. From there the tracks ran up a fairly steep grade all the way to the end of the street in North Chevy Chase. We push/pulled the car up the hill using the rope and a push pole. It was hard work! The trip down around the curves to the trestle was about a half mile, and it was a thrilling ride. We guessed that we got up to 40 or 50 miles per hour by the time we reached the trestle. It got up enough speed that it would coast well over a quarter mile beyond the trestle.

Just north of Rock Creek the tracks had been crossed by an extension of Rock Creek Drive, a narrow, two-lane, paved road (not shown on this early map). We were fortunate that we never encountered an auto at this grade crossing. There were no longer any warning signs on the road, and the brakes on our flat car certainly were not capable of stopping in time had the need arisen.

We did have one very scary event on a downhill ride. Tales of our "trolley" rides had attracted considerable attention among the boys of Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School. We occasionally invited friends to come over for Saturday rides. On one occasion one of our

"friends" unbeknownst to us placed some rocks between the running rail and the inside guard rail on the sharpest curve about midway on the downhill run. There were four or five of us on the flat that day. When I saw the rocks I knew we were in serious trouble. We bounced over the first one or two. Then the car jumped the track and crashed dead center into a trolley pole. How we all survived that crash with no one being killed or seriously injured, I'll never know. We got off with only scrapes and bruises. Needless to say the kid who thought he would give us a thrill was never invited back!

We rebuilt the wood deck afterwards and continued occasional rides. At one time a gang from North Chevy Chase stole the car from Gilly's driveway and dumped it off the trestle. Later Gilly dived in, tied a rope to it, and I pulled it out with the '28 Dodge. I'm glad Dad never knew how I got his car down to the creek to pull the flat out and get the car back on the road from there.

Eventually, we lost interest in these rides, and when the flat car was again taken and dumped into the creek, we just left it. A bit of Kensington Railway history undoubtedly remains there to this day.

Safeway Reopens

The first Safeway was located on Howard Avenue where 3758 Howard Ave is today. In the fifties a "more modern" building was built directly on Connecticut Avenue. By 1964 it was replaced by a larger version on the same property but facing Howard Avenue again. Our newest Safeway faces Connecticut, although owing to the location of the Shell Station, it's built at the rear of the lot. During the planning period (over 10 years) there were many debates, reviews, suggestions, complaints, and opinions expressed.
