KVFD Dedicates 9/11 Memorial Garden

June 25, 2011 was a beautiful sunny day for the Kensington Volunteer Fire Department (KVFD) to dedicate its new 9/11 Memorial Garden. Surrounded by its latest ladder truck and the Bell of Remembrance, the 16-foot beam from the 91st and 95th floor of the World Trade Center and

the limestone slab from the Pentagon were proudly dedicated by a roster of speakers including both the President and Chief of the KVFD, Mayor Fosselman, and FBI agent Robert McFeely.

What I thought of for an instant though was what always strikes me when I think of September 11, 2001 and that is where I was that day. I saw the Pentagon on fire from the 14th Street Bridge on my way to work. The next day when I went to work, it was still smoldering. However, here I was this perfect day at the dedication of this event listening to speaker after speaker. I did not know that the KVFD were some of the first to respond to the tragic event at the World Trade Center. And it seems they did not stop giving. They have also donated to the families of the 9/11 survivors.

And now they were dedicating this Memorial Garden for the Town to visit and perhaps just sit and contemplate; a vision come to completion. The Department was very lucky to be aided by Steve Heidenberger, president of Heidenberger Construction. Steve brought together a group of over 20 contractors that volunteered their time and supplies (saving about \$500,000 which the memorial would have cost). Steve was given a specially made KVFD construction hat and made an honorary member. The dedication ceremony was concluded by the ringing of the Bell of Remembrance, a 3500-pound bell engraved with the names of those firefighters killed on 9/11, brought here special for the occasion. That was an experience to be remembered.

When I drive by the Memorial now, I always find myself glancing at it. Not only is it an awareness of 9/11, but also of the good that is done in our community. [Editor's note: Additional information can be viewed at www.kvfd.org.]

CR Zone Amendments Delay Sector Plan

The Draft Sector Plan for the Kensington area was approved by the Planning Board in June. The entire Draft Plan is on the Maryland-National Capital Planning website:

www.montgomeryplanning.org.

Type in Kensington Sector Plan June 2011 FINAL to see the approved Draft Plan which is being recommended to the County Council which will then hold public hearings and worksessions in the fall.

The Town and County Councils rightfully want to wait until the County's new zoning amendments are approved before the County reviews our Draft Plan. The two new zones, Commercial Residential Town (CRT) and Commercial Residential Neighborhood (CRN), will be applied to our Draft Sector Plan. They have been crafted by the Planning Board and sent to the County Council for review. This summer the Planning, Housing and Economic Development committee (PHED – Nancy Floreen, George Leventhal, and Marc Elrich) held numerous meetings reviewing and

refining the new zones. The public has been involved in these meetings with comments sent in and presented from groups and individuals in Takoma Park, Wheaton, Chevy Chase and Kensington – the areas where the new zones would be applied in the Sector Plan process. The next PHED committee meeting on this will be held at 9:30 AM on September 19th in Rockville.

At the same time, the Planning Board has been working on Urban Design Guidelines, covering many aspects of future development for Kensington. They were presented to the Town's Revitalization Committee, presented at the July 22nd Town Meeting, and then presented at the July 28th Planning Board meeting. A copy of these Draft Guidelines is available on www.tok.md.gov and in the Town Office (301-949-2424). Comments and suggestions are welcomed by the Planning Board staff, as these Guidelines are being revised for a second hearing in September. The Planning Board felt that several items belonged in the Sector Plan itself, and will recommend that changes

be made to the Draft Sector Plan when the County holds their public hearings and worksessions on the Draft Sector Plan in the fall.

This process continues with the main delay being caused by the County's creation of these new zones. Your emails to the Planning Board and the County Council are still making a difference. This is your Town, which many of us hope to live in for years to come. The process of adopting a new Sector Plan is a complicated one which has been an involved process. You have been asked to partake in planning for the future of Kensington. Please read these documents carefully, understand what the changes will mean to you and your community, and share your thoughts with the County Council.

Warner Circle Update *Parks Staff Relocation Questioned*

At a hearing July 28, the County Planning Board sent a preliminary facilities plan for Warner Circle Park and Manor back to the parks staff for review.

Newly-appointed board member Norman Dreyfuss questioned a proposal to build an annex behind the historic Warner Manor in Kensington to house parks department planning, stewardship and archeology staff.

Dreyfuss said he supports demolition of a nursing home wing added in 1955 to the home of Kensington founder Brainard Warner, and also preservation and rehabilitation of the original 1894 manor, park and carriage house.

However he balked at the proposed new addition, suggesting the staff, currently operating out of leased quarters, could find cheaper space elsewhere.

In the meantime, project planner Julie Mueller said after the hearing she has received permission to continue a contract with Bell Architects through the demolition phase and re-closing of the manor walls while the staff relocation issue is reviewed and demolition permits are sought.

The property has been vacant since it was acquired by the parks department in 2006, and town residents adjoining the manor told the board they hope it can be rehabilitated and occupied by caretaker or other staff as soon as possible.
