# HISTORIC PRESERVATION DESIGNATION PROCESS

The chart below outlines the procedures in place for any property in Montgomery County to be designated as a historic site on the Master Plan for Historic Preservation and, thus, to be protected under the provisions of the Historic Preservation Ordinance, Chapter 24A of the Montgomery County Code.

## LOCATIONAL ATLAS AND INDEX OF HISTORIC SITES

The Historic Preservation Commission (HPC) initiates the evaluation of Atlas resources by having historic preservation planning staff prepare research and background materials on the resources. Then a public hearing is scheduled for the:

#### HPC REVIEW



The HPC evaluates whether the resources meet the designation criteria listed in the Ordinance. They then transmit their recommendations to the Planning Board for incorporation into:

### PUBLIC HEARING (PRELIMINARY) DRAFT AMENDMENT



The Planning Board holds a public hearing on the Public Hearing (Preliminary) Draft.

After the hearing, the Board conducts a worksession to review the HPC recommendations, the public hearing testimony, and the historic preservation planning staff's recommendations. The Board then formulates its own recommendations which are reflected in:

#### PLANNING BOARD (FINAL) DRAFT AMENDMENT



The Planning Board (Final) Draft is transmitted to the County Council for review. In addition, the County Executive has the opportunity to provide comments on the amendment. The County Council holds a public hearing and worksessions and approves, disapproves, or amends the Planning Board (Final) Draft. The Planning Board (Final)

Draft is then forwarded to M-NCPPC to become:

APPROVED AND ADOPTED AMENDMENT TO THE MASTER PLAN FOR HISTORIC PRESERVATION
